It's That Time Again! 4-H Public Presentations



The Monroe County 4-H Staff is eagerly anticipating the 4-H Public Presentations event we're hosting on Tuesday, March 3. We hope that each Monroe County 4-H member will participate this year!

Here is a great opportunity to share information about a topic that you enjoy and know a lot about with other 4-H members. This is a great chance to have fun, meet new people, work on your organizational skills, and develop your public speaking skills. Youth of all ages are welcome to take part.

The public presentation program is one of the most beneficial and rewarding 4-H experiences. It is the one most often credited by 4-H alumni as having given them an edge above peers in both college and professional careers. It provides a unique opportunity to develop a positive self-concept and poise, gain self-confidence before a group, learn to express ideas clearly, respond spontaneously to questions, and gain subject matter knowledge. Through a progressive series of communication activities youth learn to express themselves and their ideas. New skills and more emphasis on

delivery and "showmanship" are introduced each year.

4-H Alumna and parent, Dr. Sharon Peck, shares, "Public presentations are one of the pinnacles of the 4-H program. Learning to feel comfortable speaking in front of a group, learning to organize your thinking and being able to teach others are skills that we need throughout our lives. Presentations provide a low risk engaging way for youth to find their voice and feel confident sharing. And it helps us remind our children that their voices really matter."

High School Students Visit Cornell AgriTech

One cold, dim December morning, Cornell AgriTech graduate student Hannah Swegarden leads a group of high school students into a brightly lit greenhouse full of tall, flowering kale plants. She discusses how her lab crosses various varieties to produce plants with more desirable growing and consumer preferred characteristics.

This greenhouse visit is a part of a larger, day-long field trip for these students. The students are part of a high school horticulture class that is the result of collaboration between the Monroe County 4-H program and Bishop Kearney High School. As part of the class, students learn about horticulture through hands-on activities in the classroom and also get to participate in ten field trips throughout the fall semester. The field trips expose students to possible careers in horticulture.

During this field trip, students saw a wide array of new technologies being employed in the different agriculture fields. The Cornell Food Venture Center Pilot Plant left an impact on some students. "The most surprising thing to me from our visit to Cornell AgriTech was when the [Cornell Food Venture Center] pilot plant manager showed us a machine that uses electric shock on food," Caroline, a student in the class, said. The machine, a pulsed electric field unit, can be involved in juicing and uses a non-thermal food processing technique.



Stephen Reiners, professor and chair of the Horticulture Section at Cornell University, served as the faculty liaison for the high school field trip. Reiners said, "It's fun to take a step back and explain what we do to a new audience. The graduate students emphasized that the high schoolers should explore different options in college, to not be afraid to change majors, and to find something you are passionate about."

High school students appreciated the opportunity to talk with graduate students. "[Our conversations with graduate students] were impactful," Anna, a student in the class, said. "It opened my eyes to the possibilities of college; [the graduate students] made me feel better when they said it was okay to change your mind about choosing a field of study."

NYS Farm Bureau Scholarship Awards



2020 New York Farm Bureau Agricultural Youth Scholarship Information

Applicant Guidelines

- 2020 graduating high school seniors who will continue their education to prepare for a career in some way connected to the diverse agricultural industry.
- Live or work on a farm or be involved with agriculture via any avenue.
- Family Farm Bureau membership or student Farm Bureau membership is required and may accompany application.

Process and Procedure

- Students are required to complete an application which is a fillable pdf (above) and submit a brief 300-500-word essay discussing an issue facing agriculture in their county, explaining how they think NYFB can support members who may deal with this issue.
- Completed application packets must be returned to New York Farm Bureau in Albany. A
 March 1, 2020 postmark deadline or via email to sprokop@nyfb.org.
- A District level competition will be held. Scoring will determine the county winners as well as the District winner. The judging event may necessitate a personal interview and essay presentation or may be based solely upon the application and attachments. The judging will take place prior to April 20, 2020. Each District winner will receive \$100 plus a memento of their selection.

State winner selection will be made from District winners, based solely on the submitted applications; there will be no personal interviews.

A \$1500, \$1200, and \$1000 Scholarship will be awarded

The Calf Scholarship Award Program is sponsored by the New York State Guernsey Breeders Association for the purpose of encouraging those who do not presently own Guernseys to become involved with the Guernsey Breed.



A purebred Guernsey Calf will be awarded to the applicant who shows interest in the Guernsey breed and who has demonstrated the capabilities of developing the animal to its fullest potential.

Applicant must be age 9-15 as of January 1st of application year. You do not have to belong to 4-H, FFA, or a breed club to participate.

Award will be presented to the winner at the New York State Guernsey Breeders' Annual Meeting in April.



Plant Tops and Bottoms

You may already know that carrots are roots, but did you know that broccoli is a flower? Students will explore the major parts of plants where we get our food—roots, stems, leaves, flowers and fruits!

Using the story "Plants Tops and Bottoms" by Janet Stevens, students will learn to distinguish if certain foods we eat are pro-

duced on the top or bottom of a plant, and identify where fruits and vegetables belong on a MyPlate diagram. At the end of this lesson, students will be able to list several delicious and healthy "tops", "middles", and "bottoms" to eat!



PHEASANT PROGRAM VISION

To meet the current and future needs of people for pheasant hunting, observation, and educational opportunities within biological constraints and consistent with available funding.

KEY PROGRAM POINTS

- The DEC distributes 60,000 or more day-old chicks annually.
- Anyone can apply to participate in the Day-old Pheasant Chick Program.
- Participants must have the appropriate brooding facility and outdoor rearing pen.
- Release sites must be open to public pheasant hunting.
- Birds may not to be released on private shooting preserves.



- Participants must become familiar with Day-old Pheasant Chick Program guide.
- Day-old pheasant chicks are provided to participants in April, May, or June.
- Pheasants must be released at eight weeks of age or older, but no later than end of the pheasant hunting season.
- Pheasants provided to participants may not be bought, sold or traded.
