Monroe County 4-H is Zooming into Summer

Virtual themed weeks allow for hands-on learning fun

With the school year over, and social distancing limiting typical 4-H summer activities, the Monroe County 4-H program is offering five weeks of themed weeks with hands-on 4-H fun. Through videos, challenges, community service assignments, and guided activities, these weeks are designed to help youth ages 5 to 19 participate in 4-H experiences, and keep them learning, active, and engaged.

The first week, last week, was "Horse Week," with activities centered on horse facts, fun, and food. Participants drew, painted, and colored horse-themed pictures for an art contest. Also on the agenda were food challenges like "haystack snacks," treats for kids, and "treats for trotters," horse treats to donate to local stables and horse programs. Youth were also able to help choose the name of the new horse mascot for ROC Animal School. This special themed week wrapped up on Saturday, June 27.

Week two, Creative Chefs Week, will allow participants to become better acquainted with their kitchens, with short cooking activities, service projects, and the chance to share videos with other area youth. Creative Chefs Week will run from Sunday, July 5 through Saturday, July 11, with most activities being communicated through Facebook, and for those who register for the week, through e-mail with insider perks and reminders.

Remaining themed weeks will take place every other week in July and August. After Creative Chefs Week, week three with will focus on Animal Adventures from Sunday, July 19 through Saturday, July 25. Week four will be held from Sunday, August 2 through Saturday, August 8, and will feature "STEM-stravaganza." This week will introduce youth to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) concepts through fun, interactive activities.



The final themed week, Outstanding Outdoors, will keep kids moving through outdoor activities, and reflections on the nature that surrounds us. Outstanding Outdoors Week will take place from Sunday, August 16 through Saturday, August 22. It is recommended that youth register for each themed week.





Registration for Monroe County 4-H themed weeks may be found <u>HERE</u>. Activities are suitable for youth ages 5 to 19 years old, and youth do not need to be members of 4-H to participate. Participation is not limited to youth in Monroe County. Participation is free, and youth may register for multiple weeks.





Collaboration forms to encourage learning through gardening

During this time of COVID-19, the Rochester community has seen disruptions to the food supply chain that have made finding some foods challenging, and have caused prices to increase for many foods. Financial challenges due to job loss or reduction of hours have affected many families. Stress is at an all-time high, and many have found it may be mitigated by spending time outdoors. Conditions in Spring 2020 have created the perfect recipe for an increase in gardening.

As organizations in Rochester began to realize this, they formed a collaborative effort which has come to be known as Roc Kids Grow. Plans were made to support one hundred Rochester School District families to learn about and experience gardening during a time when they were socially distanced from school and other learning opportunities. "The outdoor education and hands-on growing experiences we provide in our programs for school children needed to evolve to meet the needs of this moment," said Katie Nuber, Therapeutic Horticulture Programs Coordinator at EquiCenter, INC. "We needed to adapt in order to continue serving our communities. That meant bringing the materials and instruction to families at home."

Nuber pointed out, "It was important to all the partners involved that we limit barriers to access for participating families. Gardening can be an expensive endeavor, especially in the city where planting in the ground is not always possible. Container garden kits seemed like the perfect solution for supporting youth and their families in learning the new skill of gardening at home."

Growing Out of Poverty, funded through the RMA-PI Participatory Budgeting Project, provided the resources to assemble and distribute gardening kits. Each family received a ten gallon grow bag. Bags were filled with soil donated by The Garden Factory. Families also received seeds donated by Black Button Distillery and the City of Rochester Department of Recreation and Youth Services. In their kit, families received gardening gloves and a trowel. Through the Growing Out of Poverty initiative, three RCSD students received stipends for helping fill the bags, assemble the kits and make deliveries. Cornell Cooperative Extension Monroe County and 4-H Youth Development provided a growing tips sheet and provided information that was contained on a USB Drive.

After families received all of their gardening goodies, they were invited to attend a Zoom workshop Planting Party. Lori Koenick, 4-H Educator at CCE-Monroe, and Selena Ragland, Outreach coordinator at South East Area Coalition, led families through soil preparation, reading seed packets, best growing locations, and actual planting in the containers. Koenick shared how excited the youth were to get their hands dirty in the soil and plant their seeds.

Families involved in the project will receive additional gardening and community building support through a private Facebook group and regularly scheduled Zoom calls. Rachel Betts, at Connected Communities, serves as admin for the group and provides opportunities for connection, including special gardening tips and a place for families to discuss their gardening experiences -- sharing both the challenges and successes of growing food. The project will end the growing season with a Fall Harvest Party to celebrate the abundance of fresh foods and community grown throughout the summer.

Organizations that collaborated to pull this project together are numerous. They include the City of Rochester Department of Recreation and Youth Services, Equi-Center, Connected Communities Emma & Beechwood, St. Marks & St. Johns, South Wedge Food Program, 441 Ministries, Growing Out of Poverty, South East Area Coalition, Cornell Cooperative Extension of Monroe County, and Monroe County 4-H Youth Development.








Club News: Posh Ponies

Taking a Look Back During Pride Month

Pride Month 2020 has just wrapped up! As we continue to advocate for our LGBTQ+ youth and make 4-H a safer, inclusive space for all, we thought we all should collect some useful information relating to supporting LGBTQ+ youth in the classroom, at home, and in broader societal contexts.

Below are some strategies for making academic spaces more inclusive, books with positive LGBTQ+ representation, a list of terms used in the LGBTQ+ community, and some history on LGBTQ+ rights. Be sure to check out the Monroe County 4-H Facebook page for more details on these Pride Month topics!

School Strategies:

- School staff should keep a student's orientation and gender identity confidential to everyone, even the student's family;
- Regular evaluations of inclusivity by staff and families;
- Staff are trained on LGBTQ+ issues and well-versed in LGBTQ-friendly vocabulary;
- Promoting a safe environment and being an ally is publicly praised or rewarded within the school;
- Academic curriculum includes LGBTQ+ voices, perspectives, and histories.

LGBTQ+ Terms:

- Bisexual, Bi: a person who experiences attraction to more than one gender.
- Cisgender, Cis: a person whose gender identity aligns with their assigned sex.
- Gay: a person (typically a man) who is only attracted to the same sex. Use this to describe gay men instead of "homosexual."
- Gender-fluid: a person whose identity does not align with a single gender and may shift over time.
- Nonbinary: individuals who identify as neither man nor woman, nor as a combination of man or woman.
- Transgender, trans: people whose biological sex differs from their gender identity.
- Gender: traits, often defined by societal expectation, that define an individual as feminine, masculine, or other.
- Misgender: To refer to someone in a way that does not correctly reflect the gender they identify with.
- Outing: revealing another person's sexual orientation or gender identity without that person's consent

LGBTQ+ History:

- Stonewall Riots: A demonstration that took place in 1969 outside the Stonewall Inn, a gay inn in Lower Manhattan, New York City. Immediately proceeding a police raid on the establishment, its visitors began to defend themselves and advocate for their rights as LGBTQ+ individuals. The riots were mostly led by trans women of color, like Marsha P. Johnson and Zazu Nova.
- LGBTQ+ Historical Figures: Alexander the Great, Emily Dickinson, Langston Hughes, King James VI and I
- LGBTQ+ Civil Rights Activists: James Baldwin, Simone de Beauvoir, Alicia Garcia, and Alice Walker
- LGBTQ+ Rights Activists: Daayiee Abdullah, Mel Boozer, Dan Choi, and Josef Kohout.


