#### Dear 4-H Families, Volunteers & Community Partners,

The acts of racist violence and hatred that have occurred over the last week in our community and nation have been difficult to experience and witness. These acts have been rooted in issues deep within our society are now loudly resurfacing and drawing the attention of our community, state and country. We know this to be true as adults and our hearts leap to supporting youth through these challenging times.

Emotions are running deep and range from fear to hopelessness to anxiety to anger and depression. Sometimes these emotions can all be experienced in the same day, or even the same hour.

The 4-H team in Monroe County is committed to being a support to youth who are experiencing traumatic events. 2020 has been particularly profound for black youth and other youth of color in Rochester. Disproportionate numbers of youth of color live in poverty and attend the RCSD which

has been facing challenges since January. Witnessing violence secondhand and hearing conversations, such as in the video of George Floyd's murder which has been widely circulated on social media, can be a traumatic experience.

Please watch for resources that will aid conversations with youth in this newsletter, on social media, and extending into the future. Being not racist is not enough and we will work together to become anti-racist. We must be allies to all in our community who struggle and face disproportionate challenges. Jennifer Sirangelo, President and CEO of National 4-H Council, writes "It is our responsibility as adults and mentors to show up as allies and mentors who can lift their voices and empower them to address the challenges they face head-on."

# 2020MESSAGE FROM NATIONAL 4-H

## THE VOICES WE NEED TO HEAR RIGHT NOW

The last few days have been challenging for all of America. Like many, I was overcome with emotions as I witnessed the video footage of George Floyd's final breaths. My thoughts and prayers immediately went out to the African American community, especially young people of color, who endure the pain and injustice of racism again and again with each senseless death. George Floyd is not an isolated case. We are painfully reminded of other lives lost unjustly like Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor, Philando Castile, Freddie Gray, Sandra Bland, Eric Garner, Trayvon Martin, and Michael Brown to name and remember a few of the thousands who have died. Each of these tragedies is a stinging reminder of the systemic racism all people of color endure today in countless small and large doses that are so common that now – it is simply expected.



Many faiths and belief systems embrace a divine element inherent in all humanity. In my faith tradition, we believe that all human beings are equally beautifully and wonderfully made in the image of God. Therefore, all lives have value, meaning and purpose simply because we are present in this world and have a bit of the divine in our design. It's this belief system that guided me to a 20-year career in positive youth development and to 4-H where we believe that all young people, no matter their beliefs, backgrounds, or color of their skin, can create positive change in their communities today and deserve the opportunity to prepare for life and work with meaning, purpose and positive impact.

As protests sweep across our country, it is time for all of us to step up and use our voices to create an America that finally fulfills our mission to stand as "one nation under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all." Most importantly, we do this for young people. The wisdom, clarity and humanity of our young people is THE hope for a brighter future for our country. It is our responsibility as adults and mentors to show up as allies and mentors who can lift their voices and empower them to address the challenges they face head-on. At National 4-H Council, we will always believe in them, we will always tell their stories, and we will always work to create opportunities for those hardest to reach and who need us the most.



#### **4-H Teens Spread Kindness**

#### **SMALL ACTS SUPPORT OTHERS**





If you live in Monroe County, you may be the surprise recipient of an act of kindness in the next few weeks. The 4-H UNITY (Urban Neighborhoods Improved Through Youth) group is a collaboration between Cornell Cooperative Extension Monroe County's 4-H Youth Development Program and Ibero-American Action League's Aspira Program. Teens that are part of the group are students at Eugenio Maria de Hostos Charter School. The youth have been working on different projects to offer positive impact to their community this school year. Recently they have decided to spread joy during a challenging time.

The teens decided it would be wonderful to offer bright spots to people who may be facing challenges during the COVID-19 crisis. The youth thought of supporting people in their neighborhoods and surrounding community. This

could range from neighbors to medical professionals. The teens recognized that they and others in their community could use a positive lift. Giving to others would be a chance to make kindness contagious in Rochester.

The youth made a plan for several weeks of projects. They started with blessing a neighbor or family member with random kindness. Each youth thought of their own way to lift someone else up. One youth painted a decorative birdhouse and left it on her neighbor's porch as a surprise gift.

Other projects included painting Kindness Rocks, creating sidewalk chalk art, and making gratitude cards. Supplies for the project were provided through the 4-H Program in support packages and delivered to youth by their mentor at the Aspira Program. When reflecting on being able to gift others with kindness, 4-H Teen Leader Kaelin, shared, "It made me feel good inside." 4-H Program Leader,



Susan Coyle shared, "It is refreshing to meet virtually with these youth each week. They have been thrown off schedule, are missing their friends, and feel uncertain. Through these challenges, they have not given up hope and are having fun while offering positivity and kindness to their families and neighborhoods."

#### **GARDEN IN A BOTTLE**

# For this project, you need: Soda bottle\* Scissors Nail & hammer Potting soil Seeds Water Optional: gloves

# Many Herbs Make Great Pollinator Plants! Mint Bee Balm Basil Thyme Sage Anise Hyssop

\* You can also use other recyclable containers, such as yogurt cups, sour cream containers, etc to start seeds in. Instead of steps 1 & 2, poke drainage holes in the bottom of your container, and set in a dish or other container to catch water when watering.

- 1) With an adults help, carefully cut the soda bottle in half.
- 2) Unscrew the cap of the soda bottle. With an adults help, use the nail and hammer to poke many holes through the cap. These are drainage holes, and will help water drain when you water your plant. Screw the cap back on. Turn the top upside down and set inside the bottom half.
- 3) Fill the top with the potting soil. Tap your bottle on your table a few times to get rid of air pockets in the soil. The soil contains all the nutrients that your plant needs to grow big and strong. Just like we need vitamins and minerals to grow, plants do, too!
- 4) Time to plant the seeds! Plant the seeds according to the seed packet directions. A good estimate is a seed should be planted about twice it's height deep. Cover the seeds with soil.
- 5) Gently water your soil until it is damp. Place in a nice warm, sunny spot, and wait for your seeds to sprout! When they sprout, gently water the soil whenever you notice it is starting to get dry.

#### 4-H Youth bring virtual zoo to Mary Cariola Center students

#### Annual event goes virtual in the time of social distancing

With COVID-19 forcing the cancellation of numerous events, members of Monroe County's 4-H Youth Development program put on creative hats in order to bring farm animals to students at Mary Cariola Center. The annual spring visit to the school's Elmwood Campus is always well received by teachers and students,

and a highlight for members of Monroe County's 4-H Youth Development.

This year, 4-H Youth Development members and volunteers created short videos of their animals and provided them to Mary Cariola's 4-H Club Classroom. The classroom then offered to share with all of Mary Cariola's students and residents. The videos have been posted daily on the school's Facebook page and are permanently housed on the school website's learning resource page for everyone to enjoy.

Falling under the Social Studies and Science header on the school's COVID-19 Resources page are videos introducing "Oprah-Whinny-Free," the miniature horse, "Squirt," the tortoise, "Gigi," the pony, chickens, ducklings, and more. The short videos range from calming to cute to informative, and give students a look at animals on the farm. Find the link **HERE**.

In past years, the annual petting zoo provided to Mary Cariola students and staff has been held in the gymnasium on the Elmwood campus. Here, students can touch the animals, ask the animals' caregivers questions, and get their pictures taken with their favorites. The petting zoo features familiar faces, domestic farm animals and pets, and joy for all who participate.

Mary Cariola Center is home to a long-standing 4-H club called Busy Bees, headed by teacher Kathy Lee, and taking place in her classroom. 4-H members learn arts and crafts, public presentations, community service, and more. Each Busy Bee has unique qualities and special needs that 4-H Positive Youth Development curricula has been adapted to accommodate. The initiative is inclusive, welcoming, and provides a safe space for youth of all abilities, characteristics, and interests.

"The Annual Mary Cariola Petting Zoo is a highly-anticipated and exciting event for all involved – students, teachers, 4-H families and staff. We knew we couldn't just cancel the event, disappointing everyone in the process," says 4-H Program Manager, Susan Coyle.

"The collaboration between the school, and 4-H staff and volunteers ensured that the event would take place, albeit in a nontraditional format. While hands-on, personal interaction is always optimal, virtual learning has become a format to master during these unprecedented times."

#### **4-H Leader Resources**

#### Featured Activity of the Month: Build a Water Filter

Challenge your youth to create a water filter that cleans "dirty water". This activity can be used for a variety of purposes. Use it to discuss sustainable living or practice thinking liking an engineer or scientist! When creating "dirty water", you can have a discussion about pollution and the various sources of water pollution. Use science, engineering and technology concepts to build the filters out of common household items. Ask your youth, how clean can your water get?

#### Suggested Materials\*:

#### **Dirty Water**

- -food coloring (represents chemicals)
- -dried beans (represents solid waste)
- -sprinkles (represents solid waste)
- -pieces of paper or plastic (represents solid waste)
- -soil (represents the earth)
- -cooking oil (represents motor oil)
- -salt (represents road salt)



#### **Filter**

- -plastic bottle cut in half (serves as base of the filter)
- -tape
- -napkins
- -gravel
- -sand
- -coffee filter
- -cotton balls
- -gauze



\*use these materials as a starting point, challenge youth to be creative! Brainstorm different sources of water pollution and household items that could represent those sources. Brainstorm different materials that could be used in the filter.

#### **Example Activity Plan**

Anchor: Say one word that comes to mind when you hear the word "pollution."

**Add:** Some discussion questions could be: What is pollution? What types of pollutions are there? What are some sources of water pollution? What are the some effects of water pollution?

- i. Ask youth for their definition of pollution (the introduction of contaminants into the natural environment that cause harmful change)
- ii. Different kinds of pollution: air, water, ground, noise
- iii. Sources of water pollution: chemical waste (solvents, antifreeze), detergent, fertilizer, gasoline, motor oil, heavy metals from mining and industry, pathogens, pesticides and fertilizers, silt, solid waste (plastics and Styrofoam)
- iv. Water pollution effects: harm plants and wildlife, cause algae blooms, degrade water quality, get into our food and cause allergic reactions and illness, and become sediment and change aquatic habitats

#### Apply:

<u>Create dirty water</u>- Have youth present their materials and what sources of water pollution they are supposed to represent. Have each youth mix their materials together in a cup of water to create "dirty water." Ask youth, would you drink this water?

<u>Build a water filter- 1</u>) Take the lid off the bottle. Flip the top half of the plastic bottle upside down (like a funnel) and place inside the bottom half. The top half holds the filter and the bottom half holds the water. 2) Have youth predict what the different filter materials will filter from the water. Then, build filters by layering the different materials inside the top half of the bottle. 3) Test the filter by pouring dirty water through it! Make observations about what the filtered water looks like. 4) Reflect. Ask youth if they would make any changes to their filter design.

**Away:** Ask youth how can we make a difference with water pollution as individuals? Example answers- Reduce water use, reduce the amount of chemicals used on cars, yards, in homes (cleaning, cosmetics); dispose of unused medications properly; dispose of pet waste properly
