

LEADER ACTIVITY OF THE MONTH



Featured Activity of the Month: Chlorophyll Printing

What makes plants so green? How does photosynthesis actually work? Explore plant processes that our vital to all life on Earth through chlorophyll printing!


This activity steps away from complicated chemical equations and takes a wide lensed view of photosynthesis focusing on the pigment that makes it all happen, chlorophyll. Youth can learn important plant concepts through art. This activity is from the Plant Science NYS 4-H Science Toolkit, see more detailed instructions at https://nys4-h.org/projects/#curriculum.

Suggested Materials*:

- pieces of white paper or water color paper or white fabric
- metal spoon
- tape
- green leaves (can be sourced from your garden and yard, examples include kale, bean, tomato, basil, mint leaves)

Tips:

- Have a variety of leaves to experiment with!
- When harvesting leaves be aware of poison ivy and other irritant plants



Example Activity Plan


Anchor: Ask youth what is vital for all life on earth? What do we, as humans, get from plants?

Add: Use youth answers to have a discussion about what is photosynthesis and what is vital for all life on earth.

Check in with concepts of photosynthesis and chlorophyll, make a list with the group about what we already know and help fill in with what youth do not understand. (From NYS 4-H Science Toolkit- Light is a form of energy. Plants need energy to develop and grow. Humans and animals get their energy from plants. Plants get their energy from the sun, which works to combine water and carbon dioxide to produce sugar. Plants contain chlorophyll, a green pigment that traps the sun's energy. Plants use the sun's energy to combine water and carbon dioxide together to make sugar. Every green part of a plant has chlorophyll and makes sugar).

Apply: To visualize chlorophyll, have youth place a leaf on one side of a folded piece of paper or fabric. Use tape to secure material to a surface to help stabilize it. Use spoon to rub firmly on top of paper over the entire leaf area. This rubbing transfers the chlorophyll to the paper or fabric. Youth can repeat this process as much as they would like. Ask them to describe the different shades of green and to notice which types of leaves worked best.

Away: Imagine the planet without plants, ask youth to share one word to describe the planet without plants. Encourage them to notice the plants around them. Have them take a photo of an interesting plant to share at your next group meeting.

STEMACTIVITY SE

Looking for some fun activities to keep your kids busy and active while at home? Below is a neat activity that anyone can do from home, so feel free to give them a shot and let us know if you did!

Homemade Ice Cream activity:

Materials:

- sugar
- vanilla extract
- a large plastic container
- cups
- milk or half and half
- spoons, ice
- duct tape
- rock salt
- pint sized ziploc bags
- measuring cups/spoons



Can you guess how all of these materials are going to come together and make ice cream? Go ahead and make some predictions! While you're at it, why don't you think about what other ingredients you might add to this experiment to make the ice cream taste like your favorite flavors!

Procedure:

- 1. Fill the plastic container half full with ice. Add 6 tablespoons of rock salt.
- 2. In the Ziploc bag, put in 1/2 cup milk or half & half. Then add 1/4 teaspoon of vanilla and 1 tablespoon of sugar.
- 3. Seal the bag and put duct tape around the opening of the bag to ensure that there will be no leaks.
- 4. Place the Ziploc bag inside the container and close the lid.
- 5. Shake vigorously until the mixture becomes ice cream. (Approximately 5 minutes.)
- 6. When the ice cream is done, wipe off the outside of the bag, open it, and enjoy!

Applications:

Have you or anyone you know ever used "salt" to help get rid of the ice during the winter? We just did something similar here! Ice has to absorb energy in order to melt, changing the phase of water from a solid to a liquid. When you add salt to ice it lowers the freezing point, so even more energy has to be absorbed from the environment in order for the ice to melt. This makes the ice colder than it was before, which is how your ice cream freezes.


