2020 HOLIDAY SEASON:

Fill-A-Bucket for a Family



The 4-H team is teaming up with AGAPE Haven of Abundance this holiday season to fill buckets for 28 youth and 5 families from the City of Rochester community. Each child has a wishlist and is dedicated a bucket that can be filled with toys, clothes, games, and health/hygiene products. There will also be five buckets dedicated to the families as a whole that can be filled with cleaning supplies and paper products. Each bucket will include a list of recommended items.

The Fill-A-Bucket Challenge is an invitation from the 4-H Steering Committee, suggested by a 4-H parent, to the Monroe County 4-H community to help families in need at a difficult time in a difficult year. The buckets are supplied by Runnings, and CCE staff, CCE board members, and 4-H families may pick up buckets to be filled with toys, cold-weather clothes (hats, scarves, gloves), and other miscellaneous goods for the youth. Buckets include the child's wishlist, age, gender, and size. Each family will also be supported with a bucket full of cleaning supplies, paper goods, and home goods. The buckets will be delivered to AGAPE Haven of Abundance for distribution to kids and their families.

If you would like to take part, and have the capacity, to support youth and families with this fun project you are invited to pick up a bucket from the CCE-Monore office: 2449 St. Paul Blvd, Rochester, NY 14617.

Buckets are located on the side (enclosed) porch, and will be available for pickup until Friday, December 4. When picking up a bucket please sign it





LEADER ACTIVITY OF THE MONTH



Featured Activity of the Month: Squeezy Stress Balls

As 2020 comes to a close, we reflect on the past year and how it has affected us. This activity of the month helps facilitate discussion with youth on how they are feeling and suggests different strategies we can take to manage stress. Making stress balls is a fun activity that can be done in a variety of settings.

Materials:

- -Scissors
- -Empty plastic bottle
- -2 balloons (1 balloon is optional)
- -Measuring cup
- -1/2 cup millet bird seed*
- -Markers for decoration

*There are many appropriate fillings for stress balls- rice, flour, baking soda and conditioner, etc. We encourage you to be creative and see what materials you have on hand that can be used.

Directions:

- 1) Cut off top of plastic bottle to make a funnel
- 2) Stretch lip of balloon over neck of funnel
- 3) Pour 1/2 cup of millet bird seed into funnel and gently shake into balloon. You can gently blow air into the funnel to make sure that all bird seed is in the balloon.
- 4) Remove balloon from funnel and release any excess air. Push down any bird from the neck of the balloon into the center.
- 5) Tie a knot at the base of the balloon neck.
- 6) (Optional) Cut off 2nd balloon at its base and use to stretch over seed-filled balloon to cover knot of seed-filled balloon.

This activity has been modified from the "Squeezies" activity in the Simple Gifts curriculum by Cornell Cooperative Extension.

Example Activity Plan

Anchor: Check in with how your group members are doing. One way to do this is with a weather check, ask each youth what weather describes how they are feeling right now. If meeting in a virtual format, you can ask each youth to find an item in the room they are in that describes how they are feeling.

Add: Ask what people feel like when they are stressed and what activities they do to decrease stress. Discuss different strategies group members do to manage stress. Share examples such as breathing exercises, making lists, and reaching out to loved ones.

Apply: Explain that having something to squeeze and hold can help people focus and calm emotions. Make and decorate stress balls.

Away: Show and Tell! Have each youth share their stress ball and give it a test squeeze. Ask your youth, one is one take away from our gathering today?

4-H goes virtual:

Virtual 4-H programming has become an opportunity for creativity and outside of the box thinking. Many activities that would have been completed in person have been adapted with our youth at home in mind. Thinking, what would they have at home that can be used? What can we supply and deliver? What activities would be fun and engaging? All are questions that have allowed the 4-H team to think in a different way and ensure that we continue to meet the needs of the communities we serve. By offering programming virtually youth have been able to tune in from the safety of their homes to participate in activities such as virtual birdwatching, build a seed from materials at home, and soil painting, just to name a few!

Japanese Children's Day Celebration - In Monroe County & Beyond!

In May, 4-H Educator Jessica Reid offered several video tutorials and a workshop on Japanese culture to celebrate Japanese Children's Day, through the FLX 4-H Learning Launchpad. Youth created koinobori flying carp flags, a kendama "ball and cup" toy from materials found at home, and learned how to cook udon noodles, steamed cake, and rice balls (the Japanese PB&J!) These tutorials reached not only Monroe County youth, but as far away as Nebraska! Cindy, a grandmother in Nebraska wrote to us and shared, "My grandson and I completed all the craft activities. He was a Cloverbud this year and submitted the koinobori for a project at the county fair. He received a special recogni-



tion ribbon for this project. He was so excited. I was so happy to share some of his heritage with him. I plan to continue celebrating Children's Day with him and my other two grandchildren next year."

It's a Seminar, It's a Webinar, It's a Professional Development Opportunity:



The 4-H youth development team has taken full advantage of the many professional development opportunities offered virtually. From learning about inclusivity and diversity, to how urban gardening works in different communities the 4-H team has been busy listening and learning. 4-H VISTA Destiny Draggett says, "I have never had so many opportunities to learn and engage with different community

members. In one day I have been able to talk with people about LGBTQ+ inclusivity at 4-H camps and then a few hours later have a different conversation about Agriculture in the Classroom. All without even leaving my dining room table!"

Monroe County Youth Went "Zooming Into Summer"

With social distancing limiting typical 4-H summer activities, camps, and county and state fairs this year, the Monroe County 4-H team got creative with summer programming. Throughout the summer break, Monroe County youth were able to stay active, engaged, and have fun at home through videos, challenges, community service assignments, and guided activities, which centered around five themed weeks: Horse Week, Creative Chefs Week, Animal Adventures Week,



STEM-stravaganza Week, and Outstanding Outdoors Week. The program was designed with flexibility in mind. Families were sent the challenges and activities via email, allowing for participants to complete the activities on their own time. Parent, Amy McCall mentioned that her family enjoyed the program, saying, "It allowed us to work at our own pace and discover together!"

Launching Into Online Learning: the FLX 4-H Learning Launchpad

Soon after school closings and in-person 4-H activity suspensions began due to COVID-19, 4-H Educators "launched" The FLX 4-H Learning Launchpad, to offer the high-quality 4-H experience that families value in a safe online environment. Launchpad activities continue to be offered in a variety




of formats, including live videos, webinars, and worksheets. Activities are on a wide range of topics, and created so families can follow along with supplies they likely have on hand at home. Monroe County 4-H Educators, Lori Koenick and Jessica Reid, have produced several videos on topics such as Bike Safety, Nature Crafts, Cooking Oyster Mushrooms, Cultural Exchange, and Gardening. "I think this is a great time for children to explore that there is so much wonder and discovery to be found right at home," said Jessica. These activities


